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Entry Requirements in United States of America

Travel to the United States is partially permitted. An entry ban is in place for travelers from certain locations.

U.S. nationals are allowed to enter the United States of America. Foreign nationals who have been or transited in any of the following countries during the past 14 days are not allowed to enter and transit:

- China
- Iran
- European Schengen area (Austria, Belgium, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Italy, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden, Switzerland, Monaco, San Marino, Vatican City)
- United Kingdom (England, Scotland, Wales, Northern Ireland)
- Republic of Ireland
- Brazil

There are some **exceptions** to these restrictions for:

- Lawful permanent residents of the United States.
- Certain family members of U.S. citizens or lawful permanent residents including; spouses (they must have a marriage certificate), children (under the age of 21), parents (provided that his/her U.S. citizen or lawful permanent resident child is unmarried and under the age of 21), and siblings (provided that both the sibling and the U.S. citizen or lawful permanent resident are unmarried and under the age of 21).
- Foreign diplomats traveling to the United States on “A” or “G” visas.
- Air and sea crew traveling to the United States on “C”, “D” or “C1/D” visas.
- Members of the U.S. Armed Forces and spouses and children of members of the U.S. Armed Forces
- Any foreigner seeking entry into or transiting the United States pursuant to one of the following visas: “A-1”, “A-2”, “C-2”, “C-3” (as a foreign government official or immediate family member of an official), “E-1” (as an employee of TECRO or TECO or the employee’s immediate family members), “G-1”, “G-2”, “G-3”, “G-4”, “NATO-1” through “NATO-4”, or “NATO-6” (or seeking to enter as a nonimmigrant in one of those NATO categories).

There is an entry ban **by land** on non-essential travel to the U.S from **Mexico and Canada until, at least, 21 January** (this action does not prevent U.S. citizens from returning home).

Effective December 28th, [per CDC order](#), all passengers flying from the United Kingdom to the United States, or transiting through the United States, are required to show proof of a negative COVID-19 test taken within three days of departure. Passengers will also be required to [complete an attestation form](#) and show proof of the negative test result prior to boarding their flight from the U.K. Passengers originating travel outside of the U.K. and transiting through the U.K. are exempt from this requirement. Connecting Flight information

Travelers, except U.S. nationals and those covered by the exemptions on the Entry Requirements section, are not allowed to transit through or travel to the United States if they have been in or transited through China, Iran, the European Schengen area, United Kingdom, Ireland, or Brazil in the 14 days prior to their arrival.

In case that does not apply to you, please remember to check if your visa allows transiting through the United States. If you do not have a visa, you might need to apply for one. Check all the information that applies [here](#).
